SECTION 1 - BACKGROUND AND GENERAL INFORMATION

Section 1.1 - Scope

This Statement of Work (SOW) establishes the administrative requirements in support of Programs and Resources (P&R) Department, TVCB mission. This SOW addresses the administrative services and associated support services for the Personally Procured Moves (PPM) section, Claims and Entitlement section of P&R, TVCB.

Section 1.2 - Purpose

The purpose of this SOW is to establish a Firm Fixed Price (FFP) Contract to provide an administrative support contract services vehicle.

Section 1.3 - Background

TVCB is undergoing a restructure of branch capabilities, and will require support of persons capable to assist in supporting its current mission. Persons must possess abilities in preparing, transcribing, transferring, systematizing, and preserving both written and computerized communications and records; gathering and distributing information; operating office machines; storing, distributing, accounting for stores of materials; and distributing mail and delivering messages. Also, this category of support provides protection of property from theft or damage, or persons from hazards or interference.

Section 1.4 - Period of Performance

The period of performance is associated with this SOW. Actual start dates are provided in Section 2.

Section 1.5 - Place of Performance

Work shall be accomplished at the site to which assigned as addressed in Section 2.

Section 1.6 - Contract Management

The Officer-in-Charge (OIC), P&R, Resource Management Division (RMD), TVCB will serve as the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) for technical management of this contract effort.

Section 1.6.1 - Contract Officer Representative

No later than ten (10) days after contract award, the contractor shall designate an individual who will serve as the primary point of contact for the PCO and TVCB COR regarding issues relating to this contract. This individual shall be empowered to make management level decisions in support of this contract effort.

Section 1.6.2 - Contract Site Lead

The contractor shall designate a site lead that shall provide overall management, supervision, and coordination of the daily production at all locations and shall act as the local point of contact with the Government. The site lead or alternate (acting in the absence of the site lead) shall have full authority to act for the contractor on all contract matters relating to daily operations of the contract. No later than fifteen (15) calendar days after contract award, the contractor shall provide the names and phone numbers of the site lead and alternate in writing to the PCO and COR. The contractor shall notify the PCO and COR, within one working day, whenever changes are made. No later than five (5) days prior to the start of performance, the contractor shall provide the PCO and COR with a list of all contract employees and thereafter as changes occur.

Section 1.7 - Travel Requirements

No local travel or travel outside the Duty Stations will be required.

Section 1.8 - Government Points of Contact

The OIC, TVCB will function as the COR.

Section 1.9 - Government Roles and Responsibilities

Descriptions of the PCO, COR and COTR responsibilities can be found in the Contract Administration Plan (CAP) serves as attachment two of the SOW.

SECTION 2: GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

The contractor shall provide administrative support to meet specific requirements defined in the respective functional area below. The administrative support shall meet the competency skill requirements of the various positions procured under this contract.

The below occupations are covered by the Service Contract Act. Labor Descriptions can be found in the SCA Directory of Occupations. 01000 - Administrative Support and Clerical Occupations

Section 2.1 - Occupation

Section 2.1.2 - PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

The period of performance is from contract award date 19 June 2015 through 18 June 2016.

Section 2.1.3 - HOURS OF PERFORMANCE

The hours of performance are 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The work day shall consist of eight (8) paid hours. The personnel schedule may vary for each employee to ensure proper staffing throughout the stated performance hours. This function is classified as nonessential and does not require work during periods that the Command calls for "Alpha" personnel.

Section 2.1.4 - PLACE OF PERFORMANCE

The place of performance is MARCORLOGCOM, Bldg. 3700, 3rd floor, P&R Department.

Section 2.1.5 - SECURITY CLEARANCE

Shall have the capability of obtaining and maintaining a Secret clearance for the duration of employment.

Section 2.1.6 – STATEMENT OF WORK

Duties include, but are not limited to the following:

- (1) Be able to lift 25 pounds.
- (2) Be responsible for receiving, sorting logging mail into respective business system(s).
- (3) Keep all incoming faxes sorted and processed. Answer phones and emails, respond to service members and other customers, process certified mail, and perform other clerical tasks as assigned.
- (4) Field and respond to customer inquiries received via in-person, phone, fax, email, answering system or written correspondence. Responses to inquiries must be made within two hours of receipt. These responses can involve issues related to transportation, movement of personnel, storage of personal property, collections, payments, audits and re-audits, and entitlements for moving household goods. Collect, validate, and correct as necessary, pertinent information in data records and supporting documentation.
- (5) Follow all standard operating procedures within the division and be diligent in safeguarding privacy act information of customers. Incumbent will not disclose any information regarding another customer without legal authority

Section 2.1.8 – MISCELLANEOUS

None.

Section 2.1.9 - Personnel Qualifications

The following qualifications apply to:

- Must have obtained a High School diploma or GED
- Possess a minimum of four (4) years administrative experience
- Proficient in the operation of a computer, scanner and printer to learn how to access required applications, databases and systems
- Proficient in the use of Microsoft Office Suite products such as Outlook, Word, and Excel.
- Within ninety (90) days of employment, possess general knowledge of the Joint Federal Travel Regulations, NAVSUP Publication 490, Marine Corps Orders and Directives, and an array of transportation functional areas
- Provide quality customer service.

SECTION 3 - FACILITIES AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS

Section 3.1 - Equipment and Facilities

The Government will provide all facilities and equipment as well as the consumable and logistical support necessary to perform the tasks and functions described in the SOW. Space limitations may prohibit the ability to assign each contract employee their own desk or workstation. In addition to office space, each contract employee will be provided with access to government computers and telephones, for official use only. Under no circumstances will contractor-provided personal computers will be connected to the Navy/Marine Corps Intranet (NMCI).

Section 3.2 - Access to Government Facilities

Contractor's employees are required to access military installations in the performance of the administrative services described in this SOW. Additionally, the employee will be required to access DoD computer networks and web sites in connection with his/her daily duties.

Section 3.2.1 - Physical Security and Key Control

The Government will be responsible for the key security system and, as needed, provide keys to the contractor. The contractor shall safeguard and maintain control over assigned keys. The contractor shall return keys to the respective TA that are not needed or upon contractor personnel termination of work under this contract.

Section 3.2.2 - Common Access Card (CAC)

The Government Contractor CAC serves as the primary method of identification for the contractor employees, as well as providing the basis of Public Key Infrastructure (PKI) access to the Navy/ Marine Corps Intranet (NMCI), and numerous Navy and Marine Corps web sites, which may also require PKI access. Information Assurance (IA) policies require that a background investigation be completed on each contractor prior to granting access to government computer systems. Accordingly, the background investigation requirements specified in section 3.6 below are applicable to the issuance of a CAC. In the event that the investigation has been initiated, but not completed, an Advanced Fingerprint Check must be successfully accomplished and results received prior to the issuance of a CAC. If for some reason the results of the Advanced Fingerprint Check cannot be obtained the CAC cannot be issued until the full investigation has been completed. The P&R COR, TVCB OIC or TA will assist in providing the contractor the appropriate documents for obtaining CAC.

Section 3.3 – Safety

Marine Corps Logistics Command (LOGCOM) is in the process of pursuing OSHA Voluntary Protection Programs (VPP) recognition, or has already received VPP recognition from OSHA. VPP affects all applicable contractors operating on site. It is the contractor's responsibility to ensure its employees and managers are in full compliance with OSHA requirements and have a general understanding of VPP. All contractors, whether regularly involved in routine site operations or engaged in temporary projects such as construction or repair, must follow the safety and health rules of LOGCOM. Detailed information on VPP is available on the OSHA website at <http://www.osha.gov/dcsp/vpp/index.html>. The contractor shall comply with commercial safety standards as identified by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. The contractor shall comply with all Federal, State, Department of Defense (DoD), Navy, Marine Corps (MC), and local rules and regulations to include but not limited to Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) Standards, National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standards, Navy Marine Corps Directive (NAVMC DIR) 5100.8, Marine Corps Order (MCO) 5100.8, and MARCORLOGCOMO (LCO) 5100.8. The contractor must have a written Safety Plan and submit it to the contracting officer representative (COR) for review and approval by the Contracting Officer within ten (10) calendar days after contract award. In addition to the requirements listed above, the contractor's written Safety Plan shall, as a minimum, address the following:

1. Mishap reporting procedures
2. Weekly safety meetings
3. Employee training requirements
4. Monthly safety inspections
5. Requirements for subcontractors to comply with the safety provisions of this contract.

Additional Safety requirements:

Applicable Contractors: These requirements apply to contractors, subcontractors, and their employees or agents.

Days Away, Restricted, and or Transfer Case Incident Rate (DART): Number of recordable injuries and illness cases per 100 full-time employees resulting in days away from work, restricted work activity, and/or job transfer that a site has experienced in a given period.

Total Case Incidence Rate (TCIR): Total number of recordable injuries and illness cases per 100 full-time employees that a site has experienced in a given period.

Contractors must submit their 3-yr TCIR and DART rates as part of their proposal in order for the proposal to be considered technically acceptable.

Within one (1) hour of any mishap or incident resulting in personal injury (OSHA recordable) and/or significant property damage while performing work authorized by this contract, the contractor shall notify the following:

1. The activity's Safety Representative – Deirdra Barthell, 229-639-6619 ;
2. The COR (if applicable); Bonnie Barfield, 229-639-8571
3. The Contracting Officer; Barbara A. Banks, 229-639-6761.
4. LOGCOM Installations, Environment, and Safety (IE&S) office. A written report of the mishap/incident shall be sent within 24 hours to IE&S/S11. The Government point of contact is Kathy Berry at 229-639-6284 or email kathy.berry@usmc.mil.

Mishap notifications shall contain, as a minimum, the following information:

1. Contract Number, Name of Company, and Name and Title of Person(s) Reporting
2. Date, Time, and exact location of accident/incident
3. Brief narrative of accident/incident (Events leading to accident/incident)
4. Cause of accident/incident, if known
5. Estimated cost of accident/incident (material and labor to repair/replace)
6. Nomenclature of equipment and personnel involved in accident/incident
7. Corrective actions (taken or proposed)
8. Other pertinent information

Contractor must fully cooperate with LOGCOM safety personnel during safety inspections of the workplace and inspections of required documentation.

Safety requirements listed in this package that do not relate to the contractor's operations or services may be waived by the Contracting Officer. Objections made by the contractor must be reported to the Contracting Officer within 10 days of contract award. Objections will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Smoking and the use of tobacco products is allowed in designated areas only.

All vehicle operators and passengers of contractor and privately owned vehicles are required to wear seatbelts while their vehicle is in operation on the installation and/or performing work under this contract. The use of seatbelts is also required on all mobile construction equipment operating on the installation and/or performing work under this contract.

All vehicle operators and passengers are prohibited from using a cell phone, personal digital assistant (PDA), or Blackberry™, unless the vehicle is safely parked or the operator is using a hands-free device. The use of portable headphones, earphones, or other listening devices (except for hand-free cell phones) while operating a motor vehicle is also prohibited.

Should an accident occur and in the event the US government investigates the mishap, the contractor and subcontractors shall cooperate fully and assist government personnel during the investigation period. Instructions pertaining to the assistance required from the contractor in support of an investigation and the point of contact of the LOGCOM safety personnel involved in an investigation will be provided by the COR or the Contracting Officer.

Section 3.4 - Contractor Responsibility for Safety

Nothing in this SOW, nor any Government action or failure to act in surveillance of this contract, shall relieve the contractor of its responsibility for the safety of the contractor's personnel, the Government's personnel and property, and the general public.

Section 3.5 - U. S. Citizenship

All contract positions within MARCORLOGCOM are classified as noncritical-sensitive.

Section 3.6 - Background Investigations

All contract employees shall be required to have a completed National Agency Check with Local Agency and Credit Checks (NACLC) (or equivalent) and two completed fingerprint cards prior to reporting for duty. However, a previously conducted NACI, Entrance National Agency Check (ENTNAC), or National Agency Check (NAC) does not satisfy this requirement. The contractor shall ensure that any completed investigations are accurately recorded in the Joint Personnel Adjudication System (JPAS).

Section 3.7 - Privacy Act Compliance

The contractor may be in contact with data and information subject to the Privacy Act of 1974 (Title 5 of the U.S. Code Section 552a). The contractor shall ensure that its employees assigned to this effort understand and adhere to the requirements of the Privacy Act and to Department of Defense and Department of the Navy regulations that implement the Privacy Act. Department of Navy policy and procedures implementing the Privacy Act are detailed in SECNAVINST 5211.5E (Department of the Navy Privacy Act (PA) Program), which is available on-line at <http://privacy.navy.mil>. The contractor shall identify and safeguard data, information and reports accordingly. In addition, the contractor shall ensure that contractor employees assigned to the contract are trained on properly identifying and handling data and information subject to the Privacy Act prior to commencing work.

Section 3.8 - Proprietary Information

No data provided to, or developed by, the contractor shall be used for any purpose other than the tasks assigned. All information (data files and hard copy) becomes the property of the Government and the contractor shall return them at the completion of the task. The Government shall not be required to pay royalties, recurring license fees, use tax or similar additional payments for any contractor-developed product or associated software presentation.

Section 3.9 - Non-Personal Service Statement

Contractor employees performing services under this contract will be controlled, directed, and supervised at all times by management personnel of the contractor. Contractor management will ensure that employees properly comply with the performance work standards outlined in the SOW. Contractor employees will perform their duties independent of, and without the supervision of, any Government official. However, the COR and/or other Government representative may provide direction and/or guidance within the execution of the work. The tasks, duties, and responsibilities set forth in this contract may not be interpreted or implemented in any manner that results in any contractor employee creating or modifying Federal policy, obligating the appropriated funds of the United States Government, overseeing the work of Federal employees, providing direct personal services to any Federal employee, or otherwise violating the prohibitions set forth in Parts 7.5 and 37.1 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) <http://farsite.hill.af.mil/vffar1.htm>. The Government will control access to the facility and will perform the inspection and acceptance of completed work.

Section 3.10 - Station Regulations

The contractor and his/her employees and subcontractors shall become familiar with, and obey all applicable Federal, State, Local, and Station regulations, including fire, safety, traffic, and security regulations. The contractor shall be required to have all appointments, certifications, or licenses required for each effort. The Contracting Officer may request proof of such certification or licenses at any given time.

Section 3.11 - Transition In/Out Phase

Should the incumbent contractor not be selected as the follow-on service provider, as applicable, the contractor shall participate in a transition phase to orderly and efficiently transition to a successor. The transition phase shall be considered the last fourteen (14) days prior to the end of the contract period of performance. The transition phase shall consist of phase-in training for the successor and transition of all documentation relevant to the positions specified herein.

Section 4 – DELIVERABLES - The Government reserves the right to request reports, records and submittals in addition to those identified below.

Section 4.1 - Monthly Status Report

The contractor shall develop and submit a monthly status report on company letterhead and submitted not later than the tenth (10th) day of the month. This status report should also provide a synopsis of any issues and/or concerns, and any future objectives to be achieved. Additionally, updates on any qualifications and/or certifications on contract employees will also be provided in the Monthly Status Report.

Section 4.2 – Enterprise Contractor Manpower Reporting Application (ECMRA)

The contractor shall report ALL contractor labor hours (including subcontractor labor hours) required for performance of services provided under this contract for the TVCB administrative support services via a secure data collection site. Contracted services excluded from reporting are based on Product Service Codes (PSCs). The excluded PSCs are:

- (1) W, Lease/Rental of Equipment;
- (2) X, Lease/Rental of Facilities;
- (3) Y, Construction of Structures and Facilities;
- (4) S, Utilities ONLY;
- (5) V, Freight and Shipping ONLY.

The contractor is required to completely fill in all required data fields using the following web address <https://doncmra.nmci.navy.mil>. Reporting inputs will be for the labor executed during the period of performance during each Government fiscal year (FY), which runs October 1 through September 30. While inputs may be reported any time during the FY, all data shall be reported no later than October 31 of each calendar year. Contractors may direct questions to the help desk, linked at <https://doncmra.nmci.navy.mil>.

52.212-2 EVALUATION--COMMERCIAL ITEMS (OCT 2014)

(a) The Government will award a contract resulting from this solicitation to the responsible offeror whose offer conforming to the solicitation will be most advantageous to the Government, price and other factors considered. The following factors shall be used to evaluate offers:

Award will be made on the lowest-priced, technically acceptable basis, considering the following factors: technical approach, past performance, and price.

(b) Options (if applicable). The Government will evaluate offers for award purposes by adding the total price for all options to the total price for the basic requirement. The Government may determine that an offer is unacceptable if the option prices are significantly unbalanced. Evaluation of options shall not obligate the Government to exercise the option(s).

(c) A written notice of award or acceptance of an offer, mailed or otherwise furnished to the successful offeror within the time for acceptance specified in the offer, shall result in a binding contract without further action by either party. Before the offer's specified expiration time, the Government may accept an offer (or part of an offer), whether or not there are negotiations after its receipt, unless a written notice of withdrawal is received before award.

(End of provision)

(10) PSC 9630, Additive Metal Materials.

Place of manufacture means the place where an end product is assembled out of components, or otherwise made or processed from raw materials into the finished product that is to be provided to the Government. If a product is disassembled and reassembled, the place of reassembly is not the place of manufacture.

Restricted business operations means business operations in Sudan that include power production activities, mineral extraction activities, oil-related activities, or the production of military equipment, as those terms are defined in the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007 (Pub. L. 110-174). Restricted business operations do not include business operations that the person (as that term is defined in Section 2 of the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007) conducting the business can demonstrate--

 - (xviii) 52.247-64, Preference for Privately-Owned U.S. Flag Commercial Vessels (Feb 2006) (46 U.S.C. Appx 1241(b) and 10 U.S.C. 2631). Flow down required in accordance with paragraph (d) of FAR clause 52.247-64.

EVALUATION FACTORS

P&R Administrative Services Support

TECHNICAL EVALUATION PLAN AND CRITERIA

Award will be made to offeror whose proposal contains the Lowest Price Technically Acceptable (LPTA) offer. Each non-price factor will be rated Acceptable or Unacceptable.

The evaluation factors are set forth below:

- Factor A. Technical Approach
- Factor B. Past Performance
- Factor C. Price

Factor A - Technical Approach

- The offeror's proposal must provide evidence of clear understanding of the technical requirements and the magnitude of the PWS expected outcomes and expressly provide detailed information which sufficiently supports it.
- The technical proposal must demonstrate a clear understanding of the support required for the supported Command as identified in the PWS.
- The technical proposal must demonstrate an understanding of documentation as related to the development of any form, letter, technical instruction, pamphlet, instructional guide or any other document required as a product or deliverable or as a performed service as identified in the PWS
- Be able to lift 25 pounds.
- Be responsible for receiving, sorting logging mail into respective business system(s).
- Keep all incoming faxes sorted and processed. Answer phones and emails, process and print collection letters and other correspondence, respond to service members and other customers, process certified mail, and perform other clerical tasks as assigned.
- Field and Respond to customer inquiries received via in-person, phone, fax, email, answering system or written correspondence. Responses to inquiries must be made within two hours of receipt. These responses can involve issues related to transportation, movement of personnel, storage of personal property, collections, payments, audits and re-audits, and entitlements for moving household goods. Collect, validate, and correct as necessary, pertinent information in data records and supporting documentation.
- Meets and greets customers and visitors to TVCB. Contacts the buyer providing visitor name and company/command representing. Directs customers and visitors to the TVCB OIC or TA as appropriate.
- Maintain all case files, active and completed. Prepare and forward correspondence for un-collectables to Defense Finance and Accounting Service, notification correspondence to member, and or requesting service members
- Follow all standard operating procedures within the division and be diligent in safeguarding privacy act information of customers. Incumbent will not disclose any information regarding another customer without legal authority

Factor B - Past Performance

- Demonstrated ability through past experience on similar contracts to perform the technical requirements at the expected performance level as identified in the PWS.
- Demonstrated ability through past experience on similar contracts to use sub-contracts and teaming arrangements to meet the requirements identified in the PWS.
- Demonstrated ability to accomplish work of a similar level of complexity. Evaluators will consider the scope, duration, mix of labor, services, and other tangible metrics as examples of analogous performance and allocate risk accordingly.
- No adverse information reflected in Government sources such as PPIRS, CPARS, or any other Government source.
- The Government's evaluation team will conduct a structured past performance evaluation that examines a proposal's relevant present and past performance record to determine the performance risk associated with each proposal and the degree of confidence for successful performance based on the offeror's demonstrated record of performance on similar contracts. The more relevant the past performance, the more weight that effort has in the past performance evaluation. The government will evaluate the quality and extent of the offerors performance deemed relevant to the requirements of this solicitation. The government may use information submitted by the offeror and other sources such as other Federal government offices and commercial sources, to assess performance.
- Definitions: Recent Past Performance is performance on contracts or subcontracts that have been completed within the past three (3) years. Recent performance will have a greater influence in the evaluation than less recent performance. The definition of relevancy for this requirement is similarity of service/support, complexity; dollar value, contract type, and degree of subcontract/teaming.
- The Government will conduct a performance risk evaluation based upon the past performance of the Offeror's and their proposed major subcontractors as it relates to the probability of successfully performing the PWS's requirements. The past performance evaluation will consider strengths, weaknesses, major weaknesses, deficiencies, and the overall performance record of each proposal. Offeror's' past performance will be rated using the evaluation rating scale shown below. Potential sources of performance data are Government sources such as CPARS, PPIRS, etc. and/or non-Government sources, as well as all other reasonable sources.

Price

- The Contract Specialist will perform a price analysis to determine fair and reasonable pricing. The government will use the government estimated labor categories and hours in the cost/price evaluation multiplied by the offeror's proposed rates.

Basis for Award:

The Government intends to award to the offeror whose response, conforming to the Performance Work Statement (PWS) that will provide the Lowest Price Technically Acceptable proposal. **In order to be considered award, the offer must be an "acceptable" rating in every non-price factor/subfactor.**

The Government intends to evaluate responses and award without discussions. Therefore, the offer's initial response should contain its best terms from a price and technical standpoint. However, the Government reserves the right to conduct discussions.

TECHNICAL AND/OR SUBFACTOR RATING DEFINITIONS:

The Technical evaluation factor will be assigned adjectival ratings at the subfactor level and the offer must be an “acceptable” rating in every non-price factor/subfactor. Definitions of the rating are shown below:

TECHNICAL RATING:

Acceptable - Proposal clearly meets the minimum requirements of the solicitation.

Unacceptable – Proposal does not clearly meet the minimum requirements of the solicitation.

PAST PERFORMANCE RATING:

The Government’s evaluation team will conduct a structured past performance evaluation that examines a proposal’s relevant present and past performance record to determine the performance risk associated with each proposal and the degree of confidence for successful performance based on the proposal’s demonstrated record of performance on similar contracts. Offeror’s past performance will be rated using the evaluation rating scale shown below. Potential sources of performance data are Government sources such as CPARS, PPIRS, non-Government sources, and any other reasonable sources.

Acceptable - Based on the offeror’s performance record, the Government has a reasonable expectation that the offeror will successfully perform the required effort, or the offeror’s performance record is unknown (see note below.)

Unacceptable – Based on the offeror’s performance record, the Government has no reasonable expectation that the offeror will be able to successfully perform the required effort.

Note: In the case of an offeror without a record of relevant past performance or for whom information on past performance is not available or so sparse that no meaningful past rating can be reasonably assigned, the offeror may not be evaluated favorably or unfavorably on past performance (see FAR 15.305 (a)(2)(iv)). Therefore, the offeror shall be determined to have unknown past performance. In the context of acceptability/unacceptability, “unknown” shall be considered “acceptable.”

Cost/Price Evaluation

The Government will perform a price analysis to determine fair and reasonable pricing. The government will evaluate cost/price. The government will use the government estimated labor categories and 1920 man-hours in the cost/price evaluation multiplied by the proposal’s rates. Award will be made at the proposed hours offered by the offeror.

A written notice of award or acceptance of an offer, mailed or otherwise furnished to the successful offeror within the time for acceptance specified in the offer, shall result in a binding contract without further action by either party. Before the offer's specified expiration time, the Government may accept an offer (or part of an offer), whether or not there are negotiations after its receipt, unless a written notice of withdrawal is received before award.
